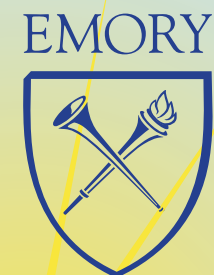

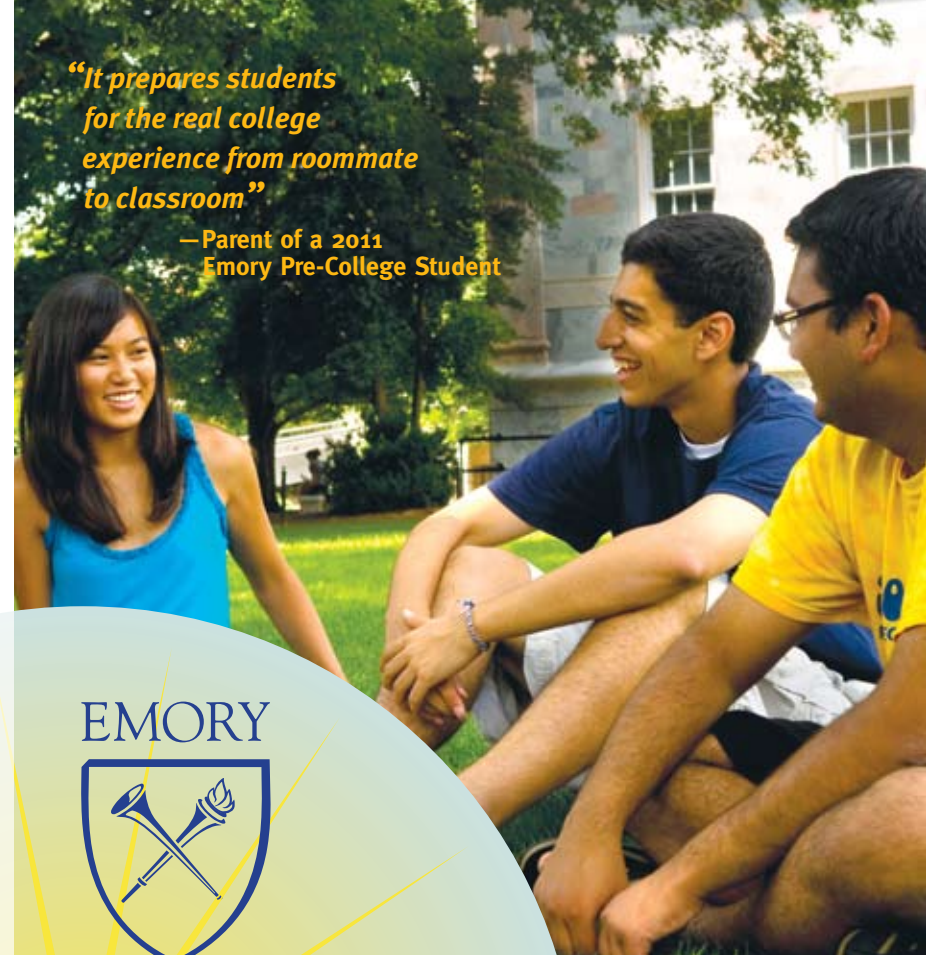

A TASTE OF COLLEGE LIFE

The Emory Pre-College Program gives rising juniors and seniors in high school an exciting glimpse of academic and residential life at a top-ranked national university. High school students may enroll in classes with college students, earn transferable college credit, and explore topics with professors who are the leading experts in their fields. Students will enjoy the beautiful, tree-lined Emory campus and its outstanding facilities, meet new people and make lifelong friends. Students come from all across the United States and the world.

COLLEGE-LEVEL ACADEMICS WITH EXPERT EMORY FACULTY

Emory offers a small liberal arts college environment within a major research university. Ranked number 20 by U.S. News and World Report and number 15 by Kiplinger's Personal Finance for best values among private universities, Emory University features a college of arts and sciences and professional schools of theology, medicine, business, law, nursing, and public health and graduate studies. Emory benefits from its affiliation with the Carter Center and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

LIVE ON A VIBRANT COLLEGE CAMPUS

Live away from home and experience the independence and responsibility of college life in a safe, secure, and supervised environment. Pre-College students live together in an air-conditioned residence hall on the main Emory campus (unless they live with their family within commuting distance of the university). Emory residence life staff help students make the most of their summer academic experience.

CREDIT COURSES (six weeks)

Students may choose to enroll alongside Emory undergraduates in regular six-week courses for college credit.

Session 1: May 21 – June 29, 2012 (commuter students only)

Session 2: July 1 - August 11, 2012 (residential program available)

Subject areas include: Biology, Computer Science, Economics, English, Film Studies, Mathematics, Sociology, Theater/Dance, Political Science

NON-CREDIT COURSES (two weeks)

Two-week courses allow students to explore a topic in depth and engage in an academic subject with leading Emory faculty. These non-credit courses are graded satisfactory/unsatisfactory upon completion of the course. Students receive a certificate of completion along with a faculty evaluation.

Session A: July 1–July 14, 2012 (residential program available)

Session B: July 15 – 28, 2012 (residential program available)

Session C: July 29 – August 11, 2012 (residential program available)

[While Emory cannot guarantee program participants admission to Emory University for freshman or transfer admission, successful participation in a pre-college summer program may enhance a student's portfolio for application to selective universities.]

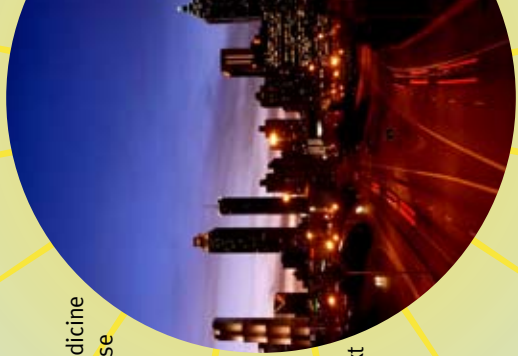

GET PREPARED FOR WHAT'S AHEAD WITH COLLEGE 101

Weekday afternoons are set aside for College 101. These themed presentations and excursions are designed to help high school students prepare for and learn what to expect from their college experience. College 101 programming may include guest speakers, faculty and student-led panel discussions, seminars on the college admission process, a workshop on writing a college admission essay, meet-and-greets with the Office of Admission staff, academic department previews and volunteer opportunities in the community.

EXPLORE ATLANTA

Learning and leisure activities extend beyond the classroom and campus gates. Atlanta offers a vibrant array of cultural and historical sites and many recreational attractions. Supervised group outings may include visits to the CNN Broadcasting Studios, Braves games, the King Center and Ebenezer Baptist Church, the High Museum of Art, the Coca-Cola Museum, the Georgia Aquarium, and the Atlanta History Center.

FINANCIAL AID

A limited amount of financial aid is available. To be considered for a scholarship, applicants must be citizens or permanent residents of the United States, apply to the program and complete the separate financial aid application (available on the Pre-College website) by the deadline. Partial awards may be offered to students who demonstrate financial need based on family household size and income, cost of attendance, and academic merit.

HOW TO APPLY

Applicants must be fifteen years of age (sixteen years of age for lab courses) by the date of registration and must be rising juniors or seniors in high school. Students should be highly motivated and committed to engaging in college-level work during the summer. Apply early to ensure residential space and course preferences. Applications are evaluated on a rolling basis until classes are filled.
